#501 - GUSTAVO DUDAMEL: CONDUCTOR SUPERSTAR

During this program, **Prof. Gil Harel** will discuss the meteoric success of the generational musician, Gustavo Dudamel, and the incredible concerts he has overseen. Among the most celebrated and widely-recognized conductors of the modern era, perhaps few have achieved the level of success and recognition of Gustavo Dudamel. Born in Venezuela, Dudamel grew up in a musical home and ascended quickly through the ranks of the top musical institutions in the nation. Having won numerous conducting competitions, he was appointed as principal

conductor of the Gothenburg Symphony for the 2007/2008 season - a rare distinction for a then 25-year-old. Since then, he has worked with some of the top orchestras and opera companies in the world, including the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Opéra national de Paris, Metropolitan Opera, and he is scheduled to become the musical and artistic director of the NY Philharmonic in 2026.


