#101 - THE ACADEMY UNDER ASSAULT - UNIVERSITIES AND THE BATTLE FOR ACADEMIC FREEDOM



MONDAY – SEPTEMBER 8

For decades, right-wing think tanks, media outlets, and politicians manufactured a culture war against academic institutions. The Trump administration is doubling down on these attacks - freezing and cutting funding, criminalizing student protest, and demanding changes to how academics operate - all in the interest of dictating what gets taught on campus. This talk maps the rhetorical strategies that began with accusations of "political correctness" in the 1990s, followed by indignations over campus free speech, critical race theory, and diversity efforts, and leading to today's

accusations of rampant campus antisemitism. **Dr Isaac Kamola** follows the trail of Conservatives' examining the contours and effects of this manufactured moral panic, followed by suggestions on how to fight back. Dr. Kamola is a professor of political science at Trinity College, Hartford, CT.

#301 - THE BRITISH EAST INDIA COMPANY- HOW A CORPORATION CONQUERED AND COLONIZED INDIA

The East India Company became the most powerful corporation in history, controlling half the world's trade and ruling an entire country. It had its own private army which, at its peak, numbered 200,000 soldiers, more than twice the size of the British army itself. **Sunil Saksena** will tell the amazing story of how this company, led by a band of opportunistic, greedy, and ruthless adventurers, managed to rule an entire subcontinent from a boardroom in the city of London.

#502 - VIOLIN CONCERTI THROUGH THE AGES




FRIDAY – SEPTEMBER 12

Professor Gil Harel will discuss how the violin concerto evolved from the baroque era's virtuosic displays, and reached an early apotheosis in the works of JS Bach. In the Classical period, Mozart's five violin concerti balanced lyrical elegance with technical brilliance, and in doing so, set a new bar for the form. The Romantic era emphasized emotional depth as well as increasing technical demands, exemplified in the works of composers including Mendelssohn and Brahms. In these later concerti, composers pushed the soloist's expressive range as well as their virtuosic capabilities.

#102 - SIX GAME-CHANGING DECISIONS OF THE SUPREME COURT IMPACTING TRIBAL RIGHTS

The U.S. Supreme Court has decided nearly 300 cases impacting the rights of Indian tribes and their members. #503 - PERFORMING FOR THE POWERFUL - THE INFLUENCE OF THE MONARCHY ON ELIZABETHAN AND JACOBEAN ENTERTAINMENT

Blood and Magic: A Look at Jacobean Theatre and Its Echoes in Modern Entertainment: Shakespeare's works span the reign of two monarchs: Queen Elizabeth I and King James. As England transitioned from Elizabeth to James, the theatre saw radical transformations stylistically and thematically. Hear from Shakespeare and his contemporaries, and discover the shifts that occur in popular entertainment as societies change their leadership. This lecture then asks the larger question: "Are those same forces at work in society today?" Using a unique blend of monologue performance and

lecture, **Michael Langlois** offers insights to classic works in a way that no lecture alone can provide. He has lectured from Connecticut to California on topics ranging from Shakespeare to using one's passions to create exciting events.

#103 - REVISITING RAGTIME

Set in the early 20th century, *Ragtime* tells the story of the cultural and personal intersection of three groups: African Americans, White upper-class suburbanites, and Eastern European Jewish immigrants. Each group struggles to adapt to a changing America. Their worlds are connected through narration from historical figures such as J. P. Morgan, Henry Ford, Booker T. Washington, Emma Goldman, Harry Houdini, and Evelyn Nesbit. The Lincoln Center Theater is opening a revival of *Ragtime* this fall (September, 2025) starring Joshua Henry as Coalhouse Walker, Jr. The musical is based on the 1975 novel by E.L. Doctorow, with music by Stephen Flaherty, lyrics by Lynn Ahrens, and a book by Terrence McNally. Join **Daniel Egan** to explore this complex

and spectacular show -- and how its impact and resonance have changed since the first Broadway run in 1998.

#507 - TARIFFS, IMMIGRATION, TAXES AND FEDERAL SPENDING: IMPLICATIONS FOR THE ECONOMY AND FINANCIAL MARKETS

US Presidents typically get too much credit and blame for the state of the economy. The business cycle is alive and well, determined mostly by the behavior of hundreds of millions of households and businesses both here and abroad, as well as exogenous factors such as weather, OPEC and systemic health issues. Policy also plays a role, although monetary policy usually has a bigger influence than anything the Administration does. But there are exceptions, and President Trump's tariffs clearly fit the bill: The changes have been so extreme that they are having significant impacts on financial markets and the economy. The plunge in immigration will also have notable effects. The direction is clear: these policies will raise prices and reduce output and employment.

The magnitudes, however, are not; tariff changes of this size have not been experienced in our lifetimes, and where they will end up and how long they will be maintained is far from clear. **Larry Kantor** is currently an operating partner at Atlas Merchant Capital, a private equity firm.



#203 - CARAVAGGIO 2025 / ROME



TUESDAY – OCTOBER 28

Serdar Arat, an Emeritus Professor of Art from Concordia College and a working artist will discuss Baroque artist Caravaggio, whose work was honored this past summer with the special Caravaggio 2025 exhibition in Rome. It included paintings on loan from the Kimbell Art Museum (Fort Worth, Texas), the Wadsworth Atheneum (Hartford, Conn.), The Metropolitan Museum of Art (New York), and the Detroit Institute of Arts (Detroit). Caravaggio's work is often described as revolutionary, cinematic, soulful, dark... His personality was difficult, violent, unstable... His life was marred with fights, a murder, prison, running for his life. All the while, receiving patronage,

major commissions and creating masterpieces, during a life cut short, ending in mysterious circumstances. Profoundly influential in his day, as well as for centuries to come, we will follow Caravaggio's trail across Italy, visiting his major works in their original sites, comparing his revolutionary style with Mannerism, which he emphatically replaced.

#304 - PUBLIC OPINION—DOES IT REALLY MATTER? THE IMPACT OF PO ON POLICY AND POLITICIANS.

In private correspondence and The Federalist Papers, the Founders wrote extensively about public opinion. They worried whether Americans could live up to their constitutional duties and pondered the general competency of the public to uphold and value democracy. As the population grew and became less agrarian, the "industry" of public opinion -- polling, market research, public relations -- developed. The industry exploded in the 1930s, a critical moment in the formation of modern democracy. In this talk **Prof. Susan Herbst** explores critical periods, ending with a discussion of contemporary public opinion – how we measure it and whether it really matters in the chaotic political world of today.

#406 - THE DEVIL MADE ME DO IT MURDER CASE

An 11-year old boy who emitted chilling screams and utterances during supposed demonic fits, exorcisms performed by church officials, and witnesses to paranormal events culminated in Arne Johnson fatally stabbing his landlord Alan Bono multiple times with a knife. Johnson was charged with first-degree murder in what became the "Devil Made Me Do It" case. Johnson's defense claimed he was not responsible because he was possessed by a demon at the time of the stabbing. Long-time public speaker, radio journalist and history podcast host **Mike Allen** covered this 1981 Brookfield murder case and appeared in the Netflix special on it. He'll reveal what he saw in this spooky tale.

#305 - THE GREATEST ATHLETES IN CONNECTICUT HISTORY

Connecticut may be a small state geographically but it has produced an extraordinary number of exceptional athletes. 

The admission fee is for the Total Experience Ticket and tour which will include a visit to some of the following exhibits: the award-winning Congo (gorilla) exhibit, Tiger Mountain, Madagascar, the Children's Zoo and petting area, the Bug Carousel, the sea lions, birds of prey, penguins, reptiles and giraffes. The zoo is 265 acres with several thousand animals. Docent decisions as to which exhibits to visit will depend on interest, time, weather, and availability of animals.
