New this Semester:

- Due to increased costs associated with operating the program, our regular tuition is now \$12 per class. Walk-In tuition will remain \$15.

Continuing this Semester:

- Please enter TBE through the **glass doors only**. This is the entrance off the parking lot. If the classroom is used for lectures, you can choose to walk up the stairs or take the elevator.
- **Glass doors** will be open from 10-10:20 a.m. Please come early so you can socialize and pick your seats. Doors will be locked at 10:25 a.m.
- **Refreshments are not served** but you're welcome to bring your own beverage.
- Classes will consist of a lecture from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. followed by Q&A until noon.
- **Masks optional**. We will follow the State Health Department guidelines.
- **Walk-ins for classes will be allowed, but will be charged \$15, which can be paid by check (payable to Learning in Retirement) or cash.**
- **Walk-ins will not be permitted for field trips.**

The policies of the current Administration have received considerable attention, and that is no surprise considering how much they differ from historic norms. We've experienced the biggest increase in tariffs in our lifetimes, a sharp drop in immigration coupled with a surge in deportations and a war with Iran that has caused energy prices to soar. These are all what economists call negative supply shocks, which raise prices and reduce output. Despite all this, the economy and financial markets have weathered the storm remarkably well. That is because we are in the midst of the biggest technological spending boom in US history. The combination of solid growth and higher inflation has shifted the focus of

monetary policymakers from lowering rates to possibly raising them. At the same time, the President appointed a new Chairman of the Federal Reserve Board largely because he was disappointed that the previous Chair didn't cut interest rates enough. Meanwhile, stock prices continue to reach record levels even as bond yields have moved up. How does all this add up for the US economy and financial markets going forward? Is the stock market in a bubble? How long will the economy remain strong? **Dr. Larry Kantor** is an operating partner at Atlas Merchant Capital, a private equity firm.

#506 - INFRASTRUCTURE WARS AFTER RUSSIA'S INVASION OF UKRAINE



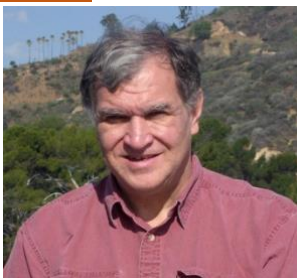

Olena Lennon Ph.D. is an Adjunct Professor of National Security at the University of New Haven. An Eastern Ukraine native, and a former Fulbright scholar, she also serves as an election observer with the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) and has completed several election observation missions in Eurasia.

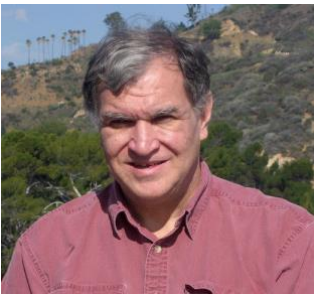

It was her first marriage; it was his third. Frida's mother was against this marriage. Diego was twice divorced, a communist, an atheist and a womanizer. She described the wedding as a marriage between an elephant, 6' tall and 300 pounds, and a dove, 5'3" and 100 pounds.

Foster Hirsch will discuss two late 1950s films starring James Stewart: *VERTIGO* (1958), directed by Alfred Hitchcock, and considered by many critics and historians to be among the greatest films ever made; and *ANATOMY OF A MURDER* (1959), directed by Otto Preminger, widely considered the greatest of all films about the American system of trial by jury. In both films, the actor, breaking his popular image as an affable everyman, takes on complex, ambivalent, hard-to-read characters. The films pose challenging questions for the

viewer about the moral choices each character makes: does Stewart's lawyer in *ANATOMY OF A MURDER* make the right decision about his client; does his detective in *VERTIGO* treat the Kim Novak character fairly?

Mr. Hirsch is the author of *Hollywood And The Movies Of The Fifties: The Collapse Of The Studio System, The Thrill Of Cinerama, And The Invasion Of The Ultimate Body Snatcher - Television*, published by Alfred Knopf.

A Three-part Series Special



How have artists helped Americans understand the meaning—and contradictions—of democracy? As the United States approaches its 250th anniversary, this question provides the central focus for LIR's *Journey to Cultural Gems II*, a **three-part** humanities program designed to engage participants in examining the nation's founding ideals through art, history, and discussion.

The program will bring participants to the Amistad Center for Art & Culture and Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art. Through exhibitions, lectures, and group reflection, participants will explore how artists across generations have interpreted the promise of the American founding—particularly the revolutionary assertion that “all men are created equal”—and how those ideals have often stood in tension with historical realities such as slavery and racial inequality.

The museum visit will include a docent-led tour of **Framing American Democracy**, a series of exhibits to mark the nation's 250th birthday. Split into smaller groups, we will explore:

Radical Roots:

The Museum describes this exhibit as: “Who participates in democracy, and who has historically been excluded from or denied full participation within it? From its colonial settlement by English Puritans onward, Connecticut gave rise to political revolutionaries and revolutionary artists alike. In conjunction with the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence (1776) and the 200th anniversary of the birth of Frederic Edwin Church (1826–1900), this exhibition untangles the Connecticut roots of American democracy and its legacy. A cross-section of objects ranging from paintings and sculptures to decorative arts and ephemera help reframe Connecticut as a hotbed of radical thought. Prompting reflection on what American notions of freedom and liberty have meant at different moments in time, these same objects offer powerful lessons on the interplay between myth, memory, and history.”

Rebel, Revolt, Resist:

The exhibition highlights the resistance of enslaved people and offers perspectives often absent from earlier historical narratives, emphasizing the refusal of enslaved individuals to accept bondage. By presenting this history through art and cultural interpretation, the exhibition invites viewers to reconsider traditional understandings of American history and reflect on how resistance, agency, and struggle have shaped the nation's democratic ideals.

In **free time** at the museum, participants will also have the opportunity to experience **Manifest | Thirteen Colonies**, a related exhibition by photographer Wendel A. White. In addition, participants will explore related exhibitions at the Wadsworth Atheneum that examine the framing of American democracy through art from the revolutionary era to the present day.
